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Message from the Board Chair

The term “public benefit” can sound arid and abstracted from the real lives of Canadians. But it’s a crucially important principle guiding the work of Max Bell Foundation. That’s because to qualify as a registered charity – as we and our partners all do – an organization’s purpose must be directed to public benefit. In essence that means tangible positive differences are achieved for the benefit of the community at large.

Effectively making those differences requires many things. Among them is seeking to understand what’s shaping, for better and for worse, the context in which charities do their work. An annual report is an opportunity to reflect on that context, and consider what it means for us at the Foundation as we aim to support tangible positive outcomes.

So much happened in 2025 across several domains that it’s challenging to distill coherent themes. We witnessed major changes in the technological sphere, from the growth in the use of GLP-1 drugs to the increasing importance and far-reaching effects of AI tools. Economically, Canadians faced decidedly different effects of tariffs depending on their region; our population growth slowed significantly; and the gap

widened between those in the top and bottom 40% of Canada’s income distribution. Our political discourse shifted too, from what David Coletto has called “scarcity to precarity,” as the US President’s words and deeds re-oriented how we as Canadians see ourselves and our place in the world.

The changes in each of these domains have had ripple effects, making our operating context highly dynamic and difficult (or even impossible) to predict. If there’s one word that captures this state of affairs, it would be “turbulence.”

In the face of this turbulence, Canadian charities have found ways to continue to make tangible positive differences for their communities. It’s been our privilege to have many of them as our partners, as the pages below detail. How have we done it?

Part of the answer is building strong, trusting relationships. Time and again we hear about the policy advocacy success of an organization that prioritizes positive ongoing working relationships – both inside and

outside of government – over single, transactional encounters. Part of what makes for strong working relationships is keen organizational self-awareness – of strengths, limitations, and one’s position in the broader ecosystem of civil society.

Many of our partners have succeeded in the face of turbulence by changing their program offerings or asks of government. Some have re-allocated their resources. Others have found new and mutually beneficial partnerships. In all cases, they’ve relied on a strength that seems essential to the moment: adaptability.

These characteristics, of course, are not just about the organizations themselves. They are fundamentally about the remarkable people who lead their organizations through their commitments to service.

Here at home with our Foundation, history reveals the Foundation has benefitted from many great leaders over the years, including that of Brenda Eaton, who served on the Board from 2006 to 2025 and was Board Chair from 2019 to 2025. We remain grateful to Brenda for her outstanding service to the Foundation. The Board is delighted to welcome David Morhart, of Victoria, British Columbia who will help to lead the Foundation into the future.

As to the leaders and organizations across civil society the characteristics they possess – relationships, self-awareness, flexibility – depend on the right support. Financial security is the essential base, but we’ve also seen the critical importance of culture, leadership, and expertise.

It’s no small feat to bring all of these elements together, but our experience continues to be that Canadian society is served by many charities that do. If there was a single word to capture what they embody, it would be “resilience.”

As a grant making foundation, we have the privilege of being inspired by many resilient organizations. Beyond inspiration, we’re also committed to learning – both how to be more resilient ourselves, and how better to support resilience in our partners. Delivering public benefit in times of turbulence demands it.

based on expert input. We made some small changes, which you can read about in the [2025 Strategic Review Report](#) available in the “resources” section of our website. Also there, under “funding priorities,” is the refreshed [list of priority outcomes](#) that orient our grant making.

As those who work in public policy know full well, there are always multiple possible ways to contribute to achieving policy outcomes. In 2025 we supported several that our volunteer expert reviewers believed show real promise. Our partners aim to:

- improve access to primary care by mobilizing evidence and showcasing case studies from other jurisdictions
- help management teams of long-term care and assisted living facilities ensure the mental health of residents receives the attention it deserves
- better understand the opportunities to improve policies that enable the community-based seniors services sector
- accelerate federal adoption and equitable implementation of automatic tax filing

- inform childcare policy by examining whether and how the current federal childcare program is meeting its objectives
- scale across multiple provinces a teaching practice that improves success for grade one and two kids struggling to learn how to read
- inform Alberta's electricity distribution policy with expert consensus bridging multiple sectors
- inform the engaged public and decision makers about the nature, consequences, and possible responses to the problem of wildfires
- inform enabling policies for and market adoption of construction wood re-use by developing evidence, best practices, and demonstration projects
- influence the modernization of seed regulations by developing regulatory proposals and mobilizing farmers
- chart a pathway toward tech regulation shared across jurisdictions outside of the US
- inform public and decision-maker conversations about how to strengthen democracy with credible survey data that compares Canada to peer nations
- inform federal public sector reform by developing and mobilizing a series of evidence-informed recommendations
- enable charities and foundations to better deliver public benefits by informing the regulatory regime governing them
- develop and launch a high-quality centre for research and teaching on how Canada can improve prosperity for Canadians

In addition to the projects listed above, Lana Wells at the University of Calgary became a Max Bell Foundation Senior Fellow. Her work will inform public policy, non-profit organizational strategies, and the

thinking of attentive publics around ways to advance a prevention approach to gender-based violence.

In 2025, Max Bell Foundation invested \$4.2 million in grants to our partners. We expended a further \$300K delivering our own programs designed to educate and inform Canadians about public policy and policy issues. Included in our programs was the seventeenth annual Public Policy Training Institute (PPTI). The PPTI provides professional development to individuals employed by Canadian registered charities to help them more effectively contribute to public policy development. More than 375 individuals have now completed the PPTI.

When Max Bell created his Foundation, he stipulated that 30% of the gifts the Foundation makes go to his alma mater, McGill University. Over the years, the Foundation and the University have partnered in a variety of ways to realize Max's wishes. Since 2018, this gift has supported the Max Bell School of Public Policy. During 2025, the School continued to grow and enhance its already excellent reputation under the leadership of Professor Jennifer Welsh.

In reviewing proposals for support, Max Bell Foundation relies on anonymous expert reviewers. We thank them sincerely for their outstanding voluntary contributions, which are invaluable to our decision-making.

We continue to look ahead with eyes wide open, and with optimism for what Canadians can achieve.

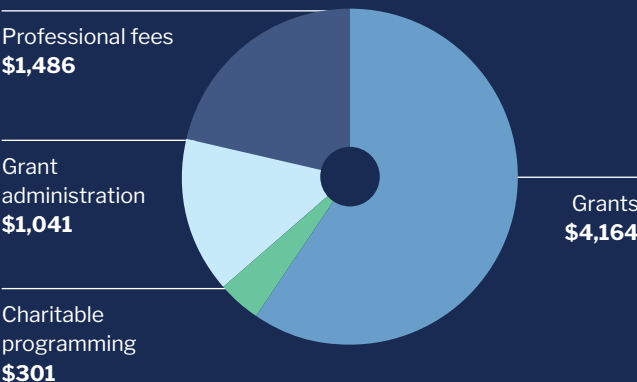

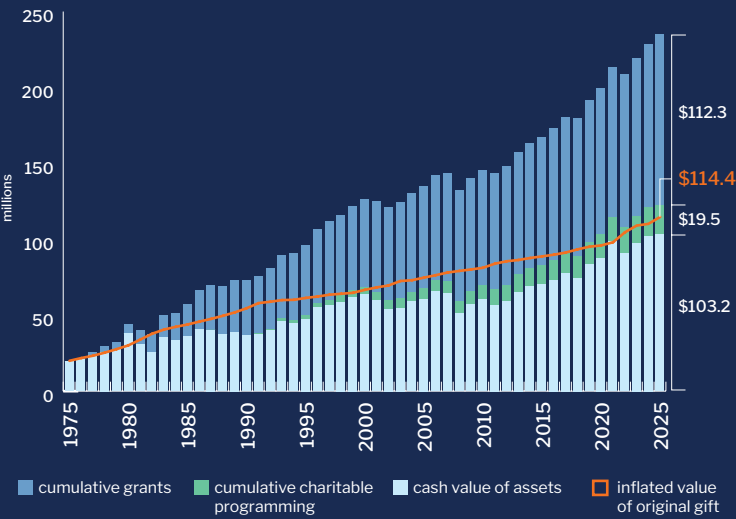

In 2025, Max Bell Foundation made disbursements for grants totaling \$4.16 million, and undertook charitable projects costing \$301,000. Combined, these account for 64% of the annual total expenditure of \$6.99 million.

2025 Expenditures (000s)

During calendar 2025, the Foundation's investments funded the expenditure categories above and their value increased from \$102.2 million to \$103.2 million. Had the growth of the Foundation's asset base kept pace with inflation since 1974, it would be valued at \$114.4 million at the end of 2025.

Since the Foundation's inception, it has invested \$112.3 million in grants to improve Canadian society, and has invested \$19.5 million in identifying, helping develop, and administering those grants as well as directly delivering charitable programs.
